### Application Deadlines

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Fall or Academic Year: February 15  
Winter: August 15

### Application Requirements

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A complete application requires: Undergraduate Non-Degree Application Part I and Part II (signed and stamped by your home university), official transcript, proof of English proficiency (potential applicants are encouraged to register for the appropriate test early; test scores should be submitted officially to the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor campus by the testing agency), and a copy of valid passport.

Students should also prepare a Financial Resources Statement, Certification of Financial Support, and supporting documents required for the I-20 form.

Full application instructions, including requirements for English proficiency scores, course offerings, and links to documents, are available online under "[Non-Degree Applications](#)."

### Application Review

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Once the University of Michigan receives a complete application, it will be reviewed for suitability in the exchange program. During the application review period, prospective exchange students should regularly check their email for important messages. Upon initial review of the application, the Center for Global and Intercultural Study or the Office of Undergraduate Admissions will contact students who are missing documentation.

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## Admissions Decision

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If the University of Michigan offers admission to the exchange program, students will be issued notification by email. In addition, students will be emailed an admissions packet which will include visa application instructions and a Form 1-20. Students will also receive information on the mandatory International Undergraduate Orientation, health insurance, housing, and arriving in Ann Arbor.

## Academic Information

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Exchange students should plan on selecting undergraduate coursework **ONLY** from the College of Literature, Science, and Arts (LSA). Access to courses in other units is severely limited and requires special permission and overrides, which will likely not be approved. Classes in Business and Engineering will **NOT** be available.

After receiving an admissions offer, students are encouraged to begin researching course offerings by exploring the course guide and schedule: <http://www.lsa.umich.edu/cg/>. Courses are subject to change each semester, and may not be offered every semester. Prior to departure, students will be contacted by an academic advisor who will assist with course registration in advance. The University of Michigan cannot guarantee courses, but will work with students to select an appropriate course schedule in advance of arrival. Students should plan on registering for 12-18 credits per semester.

### NOTE:

Qualified students apply to the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts and may enroll in courses from any department in the college. **Courses in Economics, Computer Science, Communication Studies, Psychology, and Political Science are particularly difficult to enroll in.** CGIS cannot guarantee enrollment in any specific courses, especially from these five departments. Therefore, students should not depend on enrollment in courses primarily from these departments.

## Language of Instruction

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All courses are taught in English, unless otherwise indicated. Students seeking additional English instruction may also select courses from the Sweetland Writing Center. The University of Michigan offers language courses in over 65 languages.

## Transcripts

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The University of Michigan provides students with free official transcripts, available to order online. A copy will be ordered by CGIS and sent to the student's international office at their home school.

## Accommodations

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Students are responsible for making their own housing arrangements, and should plan on making housing arrangements prior to departure, following admissions. Students interested in on-campus housing should plan to apply for accommodations as soon as they are notified of acceptances. Ann Arbor offers a variety of housing, both on and off campus, to suit a variety of living needs.

Exchange students typically enjoy residence halls (dorms) because rooms are shared with another student (from all over the U.S. and world), meal plans can be purchased, and many activities are available. Residence Halls are a true part of the U.S. college experience.

The GSP, a traditional dorm experience with added intercultural learning sessions and community, is located in North Quadrangle Residence Hall. Students must apply both to the Global Scholars Program and to the U-M Housing office.

Co-op houses are another option similar to residence halls, but they are not part of the U-M Housing system. Many students prefer co-op houses because they offer a community atmosphere, but more independence than on-campus housing. Each “house” has its own arrangement and customs, so research is recommended.

### **Arrival and Orientation**

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Orientation is mandatory for all exchange students. During orientation, students will learn about health and safety resources, learn how to meet with academic advisors, and learn about the U.S. educational system.

Students will perform their mandatory immigration check-in online upon arrival. They will be required to submit scanned copies of their immigration documents so that the International Center can activate their SEVIS record.

### **Fees**

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Exchange fees are required to register for 12-18 credits per term, which are covered through a tuition waiver for most exchange agreements. Students registering for more than 18 credits will be charged additional tuition per hour. Some courses may carry an additional Lab Fee, which is not covered as part of the exchange agreement: <https://ro.umich.edu/tuition-residency/tuition-fees/class-fees>. A few exceptions apply; please consult the exchange agreement for specific terms.

### **Health and Safety**

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All international students are required to purchase [health insurance](#), which is coordinated by the International Center. New students will automatically be enrolled for health insurance during orientation. A few exceptions apply; please consult the International Center for health insurance waiver information.
