#### NOMINATION AND APPLICATION PROCEDURES

Nomination deadline	8 May for both I (Fall) and / or II (Spring) semester
Nomination procedures	All exchange students must be <b>nominated by their home university</b> . The home coordinator must e-mail the <u>nomination sheet</u> to relint@luiss.it
Application period (Including housing)	01/03 to 15/05 for both I (Fall) and / or II (Spring) semester
Application deadline for II semester	Luiss does not accept a second round of selected students for the II (Spring) semester, after the summer. Very few exceptions can be made and they have been agreed on with the partners involved.
Application procedures	Online application system
	Application steps for incoming students:
	After being nominated by the home university, exchange students will receive an email with an <b>access code</b> (token) and instructions to <b>register</b> to our online Web Self-Service Platform.
	<b>Registration</b> Students must register to the Web Self-Service. Enter the <b>access code</b> , first name, last name and date of birth. The information entered must match the data we received from home university.
	If registration is successful, students will be allowed to login to the system using their <b>newly assigned username and password</b> . <b>We recommend</b> <b>saving this page, print it, or note down the credentials for future use</b> (a copy will also be sent to the student's e-mail address).
	By logging into the system students will be able to proceed to the next step.
	<b>Application</b> From the Web Self-Service user page, in the right-hand page, students should click on Study abroad > Application Form for Incoming students (Erasmus/Exchange).
	Students will have to upload the following scanned documents:
	<ul> <li>A recent photograph (35x40mm, max 5MB, in JPEG, JPG, BMP or PJPEG) *</li> <li>ID card (for Schengen countries) or passport for non-EU students*</li> <li>Updated transcript of records in English*</li> </ul>

- A provisional Learning Agreement signed by the home university coordinator for Erasmus students\*
- Language certificates (if required, check with home university)

#### **ACCEPTANCE OF STUDENTS** In June From the end of May, as soon as application forms are processed, the Student Mobility Office will send the incoming students an acceptance letter and practical information via e-mail. ### **REQUIREMENTS FOR EXCHANGE STUDENTS**

Although a specific minimum GPA is not required, incoming students should be in <b>good academic standing</b> .
With <b>most of our partners</b> we have agreed that the language proficiency will be certified by each home university confirming the level is equivalent to at least <b>B2 in English or Italian</b> and <b>students will not be required to submit an official language</b> <b>test result for the exchange program</b> .
Please notice that <b>knowledge of Italian language is not</b> <b>required for students studying in English</b> .
From our partner Universities with whom we have not agreed on a language certificate waiver we will require one of the following proofs of language proficiency for English OR Italian language to study at Luiss.
A minimum of <b>B2</b> of the CEFRL or equivalent. Italian language proficiency can be certified by the home university.
IELTS score a minimum of 6 TOEFL IBT score - minimum grade 78 Cambridge FCE - minimum grade B Cambridge CAE - minimum grade C IELTS and TOEFL tests must be valid, they expire after two years

Maximum number of credits	Although for enrolment purposes and deadlines, exchange students will be allowed to enroll in up to 40 ECTS credits per semester, <b>they are strongly advised not to take more than 32</b> credits per semester (not including the Italian language course).
Courses exchange students can take	Exchange students will be given access <b>to all the courses at Bachelor and /or Master</b> level if they <b>have the necessary prerequisites</b> and do not have time-table clashes.

Elective courses	Elective courses in all areas will be offered only if enough students register for the courses. The final list will be available in August.

Cross-program enrolment	Incoming Exchange students will be given access to all the courses in the Undergraduate and Graduate Luiss schools in the areas of Business and Management, Economics and Finance, Political Science and Law.
	Students must have the required pre-requisites for each course and avoid time-table clashes.
The area of Law	The area of Law offers a five-year single cycle degree program. The courses in the fourth and fifth years of study are more advanced and equivalent to Master level. In addition to this, a 2- years master's degree program of 120 ECTS credits is also offered.

Italian language course	Luiss offers Italian language extensive courses in both semesters for exchange students who have been admitted to attend a period of study at Luiss, under an exchange program (Erasmus+ or Bilateral Agreement). The courses are at three levels, beginners, intermediate and advanced <b>and are free of charge for the students.</b> The students that attend the courses and comply with the requirements will receive a certificate and gain 3 ECTS credits, per semester.
Course enrolment	Students coming for the Fall semester will have to make a <b>provisional course registration</b> in <b>June/July</b> while students coming for the Spring will make it in <b>November/December</b> .
	The <b>final course selection</b> will take place at the <b>beginning</b> of each <b>semester</b> . Students will have one week to change courses if necessary. Detailed information will be sent with the acceptance letter.
	Courses have a limited capacity and the allocation of places will take place on a first come first served basis.

### **EXAMINATION PERIODS AND ASSESSMENT**

Luiss Uniqueness – Enquiry-based learning	Luiss Uniqueness is an educational approach which combines academic rigor and practical relevance to equip students with the critical thinking required to solve daily and future challenges At the heart of the Luiss ethols is its <b>enquiry-based learning</b> <b>model</b> , which teaches students how to formulate qualified questions and informed opinions about the complex world in which we live. This unique approach is student-oriented and involves curricular and extracurricular activities that connect students with Luiss university's privileged network of real-world practitioners in business, institutions, and public administration. Via guest lectures, research projects and teamwork, students experience meaningful learning and see first-hand how to play an active and valuable role in society. The Luiss educational
	journey is one of investigation, innovation, interaction and interdisciplinarity.
Examination periods	Exams are held after the teaching period and can be oral, written or both. Depending on the area and level, some courses will have two or three examination dates and students can choose the one they prefer.
	Courses included in the degree programs <b>adopting the enquiry- based model</b> will have only <b>one examination date</b> available in December or May depending on the semester and study period. For these courses the students' performance will be continuously assessed throughout the whole semester and will constitute the main component of their final grade. The traditional final exam will account for no more than 30%.
	The exact examination dates for each subject will be defined about a month and a half before the beginning of the examination session.
	Students should make their <u>travelling arrangements according</u> to the examination periods.
Final assessment	<b>Exams can be taken only on the official dates.</b> Exchange students will take their exams in the same conditions as regular students. Exchange students are NOT authorized to organize their exams individually with their professors.
Proctored Exams	According to the Italian examination system Luiss cannot allow proctored Exams.
Transcript of records	Transcripts of records will be sent by email to the Partner Institutions 4 weeks after the end the examinations periods of each examination session.

### ACCOMMODATION

Application for housing	Students must apply for housing through a web form during their online application to Luiss.
Type of housing offered	The Luiss University Accommodation Office is available <b>to assist</b> incoming exchange students in their search for housing.
	Students can apply for <b>a room in a Luiss Residence or in an</b> <b>apartment shared</b> with other students. More details about the residences can be found at <u>https://www.luiss.edu/students/residences-and-</u> <u>accommodation/luiss-residences</u> . There <b>are limited places</b> <b>available</b> and they will be assigned on a first-come first-served basis. Students will receive feedback on the outcome of their housing application by the deadline. Students interested in living in an apartment will receive an email from <u>CasaLuiss</u> with customized proposals in accordance with the preferences expressed in the housing application form. The apartments are chosen among previously selected private owners and will be rented out with clear conditions and a regular contract.

VISA AND INSURANCE	
Health insurance	<b>Non-EU students</b> must hold a health insurance policy meeting the following requirements:
	<ul> <li>It must cover expenses in the event of emergency treatments and/or urgent hospitalization.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>It must cover the entire duration of your stay in Italy.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>It must be valid for the territory of all member-states applying to the Schengen Agreement in its entirety.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>It must guarantee the policy-holder's return to his/her own country in case of serious illness.</li> </ul>

	• It must be translated into Italian (or English) and legalized by the Italian Embassy/Consulate.
	<b>EU students</b> must bring their <b>European Health Insurance Card (EIHC)</b> which entitles the holder to get necessary treatments at the same cost as an Italian citizen. Students are advised to verify how to get the card and which services are covered with the social security administration of their country before their departure. Permit of stay (for non-Schengen citizens)	After arrival, students coming from non-Schengen countries will need to apply for permit of stay. To do so students must bring the following:

Private insurance from home countries is sometimes not accepted at the Questura, unless an official paper from the Italian Embassy or Consulate of home country states the validity of the insurance.</li> <li>Students will receive detailed information before arrival with their acceptance letter.</li> </ul>
