STUDENT APPLICATIONS

Eligibility	 Minimum 3.0 GPA equivalency Evidence of solid academic preparation. English Language Test taken within two years of application deadline (unless waived). Minimum DuoLingo English Test score of 130. Results should be sent via DuoLingo by filtering institution type to "Other" and selecting University of Pennsylvania - Exchange at Penn (Penn Abroad), or Minimum IELTS Overall Band score of 7.0, sent to Penn Abroad via the IELTS website, or Minimum TOEFL-IBT (Internet-Based Test) score of 100 OR TOEFL-PBT (Paper-Based Test) score of 600. The Penn Abroad TOEFL Destination (DI) Code is 3221.

Application Procedures	 Nominated students will receive an e-mail from Penn Abroad with further instructions on how to access our online application system and submit materials. English Language Tests taken within two years of application deadline must be submitted via the appropriate test's online portal (unless waived). No application materials should be mailed. Visa Application	 All exchange students who are not US citizens or permanent residents are required to have a student visa to study in the United States. Penn's International Student and Scholar Services will provide information and assistance for J-1 and F-1 student visa applications to accepted exchange students. US citizens or permanent residents should notify Penn Abroad and provide a copy of their US passport or permanent residence card when applying.

Course Load Requirements	 Exchange students are required to maintain full-time enrollment status while studying in the United States. Students must enroll in a minimum of four course units (usually four courses) per semester to maintain full-time enrollment status. Exchange students are eligible to take undergraduate courses up to the 4999-level. Students are permitted to enroll in up to two courses outside of their admitting school per semester. Students are not permitted to take graduate-level courses OR courses in Penn's Law, Medical, Dental, or Veterinary Schools.

Grading Scale and Transcripts	• Letter grades ranging from A to F (with no D- or E) are used to report the standing of a student upon the completion of each course. Transcripts are sent to the home university coordinator via secure email approximately one month after the end of the student's final semester at Penn. Only ONE free transcript per student will be sent from the registrar to the host university coordinator. Coordinators will have two weeks to download the electronic transcript. Paper copies of the transcript will not be mailed. Students must request and pay for additional copies of the transcript.
Course Registration	 Course descriptions and course offerings for specific semesters can be found on the Course Search website: <u>https://catalog.upenn.edu/course-search/</u> Exchange students are assigned an academic advisor from their admitting school/college. Students register for courses online before beginning their semester. Course offerings vary each semester and exchange students cannot be guaranteed enrollment in any particular course. Some courses require proof of successful completion of pre-requisites or instructor permission to register. Students should work with the appropriate academic advisor or instructor upon arrival at Penn for registration in these courses.

POST-ACCEPTANCE INFORMATION

Housing and Meals	 All exchange students are required to live on campus in Penn housing unless meeting conditions of a qualified exemption. Students must complete an online application for housing after being accepted into their exchange program. NOTE: Due to high demand and low supply, exchange students often share a room with a roommate and rarely are placed in single bedroom units. Health Insurance and Immunizations	 All exchange students are required to enroll in a comprehensive health insurance as a condition of enrollment at the University of Pennsylvania, and as a requirement set forth by the United States for all F-1 and J-1 students. Students have the option to enroll in the Penn Student Insurance Plan or to enroll in another insurance plan of their choosing, provided it meets certain minimum criteria set forth by Penn Student Health Services. Please review insurance requirements here. All exchange students must also submit proof of compliance with Penn's immunization requirements following acceptance.
Orientation and Events	 Students admitted for the fall semester or academic year are required to attend a mandatory New Student Orientation program. Students will be charged a fee to cover event participation and meals. More information: www.nso.upenn.edu Students admitted for the spring semester are required to attend the mandatory Exchange Student Orientation program in January. A fee to cover events and meals will be assessed to students. Throughout the semester, Penn Abroad organizes events and excursions to introduce students to the culture of Penn, Philadelphia, and the United States. These trips and mixers allow exchange students to meet and mingle with their Penn peers and make lasting connections.

Estimated Costs

- Tuition and academic fees are waived for exchange students. Exchange students are responsible for all other expenses incurred during their time at Penn.
- The following estimates are for the 2023-2024 Academic Year:
 - ◊ Housing: \$12,166
 - Meals: \$6,330
 - ◊ Books & Supplies: \$1,358
 - ♦ Health Insurance: \$4,210
 - ♦ Local Transportation: \$1,062
 - Miscellaneous and Personal Expenses: \$2,368
 - ◊ Round trip flight to Philadelphia (varies): \$1,700
 - ◊ Clinical Fee*: \$664
 - Incoming Exchange Orientation & Student Activities Fee:
 - ⇒ Fall/Academic Year Admitted Students: Approximately \$420; covers housing, orientation programming, most meals during <u>New Student Orientation</u>; subsidizes social and cultural programming during term
 - $\Rightarrow~$ Spring Admitted Students: Approximately \$160; covers orientation programming; subsidizes social and cultural programming during term
- To obtain a student visa, students must produce financial documentation showing that they have at least \$30,408 (for two semesters) or \$15,204 (for one semester) in assets. These numbers are accurate for 2023-24, but will change for 2024-25. - * The <u>Student Health Service Clinical Fee</u>, which includes unlimited nursing and doctor visits, is charged to all Penn students, including exchange students each semester.
- These figures are estimates for the entire academic year and may vary greatly depending on individual spending habits. All estimates are subject to change without notice.
