^{*}Students with scores below 79 or 6.5 are required to take English courses. They are not eligible to enroll in Carlson School of Management courses.

German students may provide a DAAD score of B2 or C1. Students will also be required to test upon arrival and may be required to take additional ESL classes.

Credits & Grading

A typical class is equal to 3 or 4 credits, and most students register for 3 to 5 classes. Undergraduate students must enroll in at least 12 credits to be considered full-time, a requirement for their student visa. We strongly recommend students do not register for more than 16 credits. The University has two distinct grading scales: A-F and S-N (pass/fail). More information can be found at the <u>UMN Policy Library</u>.

Housing

Students are guaranteed University-owned housing if they request housing on their application and apply for their specific choices by the deadline. Students can choose from the University housing options listed below or find their own housing off campus.

- <u>Radius</u>: New, fully furnished apartment-style accommodation with many amenities.
 Located within a 10-minute walk from campus in the Dinkytown neighborhood. No meal plan is required.
- Yudof: Fully furnished apartment-style accommodation located on campus. All units have a kitchen or kitchenette. No meal plan is required.
- <u>Centennial</u>: Traditional dormitory-style accommodation located on campus. Students can live in a single or shared room, and share a common bathroom with other units. A <u>meal plan</u> is required, as there are no kitchens.
