

1 Exchange Programmes

FULL SEMESTER EXCHANGE

Partner Universities	This exchange option allows student exchange worldwide at partner universities on Bachelor and Master level.
SWISS MOBILITY	The Swiss Mobility programme enables Bachelor and Master students to study at another university within Switzerland. AUTUMN September December
FREEMOVER	Students enrolled at a university that is not a HSG partner university can apply for a freemover exchange semester.
THEMIS	The International Legal Network of Excellence offers a joint certificate programme in International and Business Law for law Master students focussing on theoretical and practical business law skills.
ECOL	ECOL (European Common Online Learning) is a network of six leading European business schools offering a virtual exchange programme on undergraduate level.
CEMS	CEMS is a global alliance of academic and corporate institutions dedicated to educating and preparing future generations of international business leaders. Can be combined with all our Master programmes.
DOUBLE DEGREE	The University of St.Gallen offers several double degree programmes that award students two full master's degrees from the partnering institutions. Most graduate programmes in St.Gallen offer a double degree option.
START FELLOWSHIP	START Fellowship is an accelerator programme for young entrepreneurs from low- and middle-income backgrounds, focused on Latin American and African students. It offers online and offline sessions with experienced investors, classes at the Uni- versity of St.Gallen, mentoring, and coaching with experts. (Spring semester only.)

SPECIALISED SHORT-TERM PROGRAMMES

ISP

This 10-week programme requires students to be enrolled in an MBA at their home university and have significant work experience. The programme can accomodate a maximum of 35 students. Courses are taught entirely in English. isp.unisg.ch

2 Courses

COURSE INFORMATION

Courses are offered in English in Business Administration, Economics, International Affairs, Social Sciences and Law. The definite course programme is available approximately one month before the semester starts. Guest students are strongly recommended to attend courses that correspond to their level of study at their home university.

Bachelor

Bachelor students attend bachelor courses and may only attend master's courses if necessary and if prerequisites are fully met. Master's core courses are not open for guest undergraduate students.

Master

Master students attend master courses and may attend Bachelor courses if necessary.

COURSE REGISTRATION

Course registration takes place through an online course registration procedure (bidding) about three weeks before the semester begins. Student Mobility Services will inform guest students about the process well in advance.

Further information

Courses take place throughout the entire semester (13 weeks) and/or in block seminars.

REQUIRED WORKLOAD

The workload per semester averages 24-30 ECTS credits. Guest students are required to take at least 16 ECTS credits and may not exceed 40 ECTS credits (THEMIS max. 33 ECTS) per semester. Credits are awarded only for successfully passed courses.

Special workload requirements apply to CEMS and THEMIS according to their corresponding curriculum regulations.

1 ECTS = 30 course-related working hours (in and out of class)

3 Examinations

Examinations may be taken only for successfully allocated courses.

FORMAT

Examinations may be oral and/or written.

Presentations/course participation may also constitute part of the final grade. The examination format is indicated in the course information sheet available on:

EXAMINATION PERIODS

At the HSG there are two different types of examination periods:

- Decentral and Mid-Term examinations take place within or at the latest at the end of the lecture period.
- Central examinations take place after the end of the lecture period.

Guest students are entitled to take all examinations within the lecture period (= same time frame as decentral examination period).

The examination type of each course is indicated in the course information sheet.

GUEST STUDENTS ENROLLED FOR TWO CONSECUTIVE SEMESTERS

Students staying for two consecutive semesters must take examinations for their first semester courses as specified in the course information sheet.

If a "central examination" is specified, guest students may schedule a "decentral guest examination" if the course instructor permits.

HOUSING

The Housing Office provides off-campus housing. Housing is assigned on a first come, first served basis.

- Contract durations:
 For Autumn semester 01 Aug. 31 Dec.
 For Spring semester 01 Feb. 31 May
- Non-refundable application fee: CHF 250 (required)
- Housing price per room: CHF 700 to CHF 1050 or higher per month, depending on personal requirements
- Liability insurance: approx. CHF 20

MONTHLY LIVING EXPENSES

Accommodation (rent plus utilities) CHF 700 to CHF 1050; Food CHF 600; Communication (telephone, internet, TV) CHF 70; Transport (public and private) CHF 180; Insurances (liability, health) CHF 100 to CHF 280; Leisure activities CHF 150; Other CHF 100 to CHF 150.

TRANSPORTATION

In Switzerland, travelling by public transport is very convenient and it is encouraged. Students are advised to obtain the Swiss Federal Railway half-fare card in order to save 50% on all tickets for trains, buses, trams, ferries. It is available from CHF 120 (under 25 years old) and valid for one year.

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION

German and English (course availability will vary depending on degree programme).

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

German

For courses taught in German, no formal German certificate is required, but guest students are expected to have a language level equivalent to B2 (CEFR).

English

All programmes (except ISP): For courses taught in German, no formal German certificate is required, but guest students are expected to have a language level equivalent to B2 (CEFR).

ISP: For the ISP, non-native English speakers must provide a valid TOEFL score of 89 (iBT) or IELTS score of 6.5. This requirement is waived for students enrolled in an English-taught MBA at their home university.

LANGUAGE COURSE

Incoming exchange students are welcome to enrol in regular language courses offered by the University of St.Gallen during the semester.

A variety of languages is available — such as Chinese, English, French, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Spanish, and Russian — and these courses are open to guest students.

STEP 1: ONLINE NOMINATION BY STEP 2: STUDENT ONLINE PARTNER UNIVERSITY

Nominations must be entered in our online portal Mobility-Online using the personal login provided. Login data should be kept on record for future nominations.

Nominated students must be enrolled at their home university in study fields similar to degree study fields of the University of St.Gallen (Management, Business Administration, Economics, Political Sciences and Law).
